A Positive School Culture is something school leaders design and plan for now...










Planning for Teachers: Day Before Students Arrive







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Ex	Building Relationships: ample Activities for the Classroom
	The HOW
Greet at the door	 Stand by the door during transition periods. Welcome each student by name with a positive statement. Use a connection signal (high-five, shaking hands, fist bump, thumbs up, etc.) Monitor the hallway and classroom to reinforce expectations (make positive comments or redirections when needed).
2 minute connect	 Create a slide with an engaging question (your favorite, would you rather, if/then, etc.) Read the question and review your routine for partner conversations. Direct students to talk with their partner. Set a timer for two minutes. Walk around and listen to conversations. When time is up, ask or randomize 1-2 students to share out. Share your answer with the class. Plan for time to complete this activity 2-3 times per week at the beginning or

Each monday, plan for a 2 minute partner conversation (like 2 minute ٠ connect) for students to share with each other how they spent their weekend.




